For HomeFront, 2015 was a truly notable year. While we faced new challenges and saw the effects of the economy on domestic violence, we also saw great success and a vast increase in our public awareness.

In June of 2015, HomeFront launched its first wide scale domestic violence awareness campaign in partnership with Checker Cabs. This ground-breaking campaign utilized messages of hope and empowerment to involve community in ending domestic violence. We received widespread attention and reach throughout the summer months, and dramatically increased our profile in the public sphere, as well as mainstream and social media. HomeFront launched its second annual My HomeFront campaign in June 2016, and we look forward to building on the successes of last year and remaining top of mind within the community.

In the midst of difficult economic times, we are incredibly grateful that our funders continue to support HomeFront. At a time when so many cuts are being made, we are grateful that the Government of Alberta, the City of Calgary and the Calgary Police Service acknowledge the success of HomeFront's integrated service delivery model and impact on the community.



#### Financial Accountability



#### Domestic Conflict Response Team (DCRT)

The Domestic Conflict Response Team is an integrated community-justice program that collaborates with the Calgary Police Service and Child and Family Services to provide a timely and effective outreach response for people dealing with domestic conflict. In these situations, police have been called out but no charges have been laid. The DCRT works with families in their homes using a holistic approach in order to interrupt the cycle of abuse in its early stages.




#### Domestic Violence Intervention and Resource Team (DVIRT)

The Domestic Violence Intervention and Resource Team (DVIRT) works in collaboration with the justice system, the police and community partners to support victims as their case moves through the justice process. Case Managers provide victims with support, information, education, referrals, and advocacy, ultimately ensuring victims are safe and supported through this often overwhelming and difficult journey.



#### High Risk Management Initiative (HRMI)

The High Risk Management Initiative continues to thrive despite a lack of funding. This critical and life-saving initiative has been adsorbed into HomeFront casework practice and continues to collaborate with all partners on active files. HRMI targets the top most violent and dangerous domestic violence offenders and provides monitoring, intervention and risk assessment, while ensuring extensive and wrap around support services for the victims in these cases.



#### Research & Evaluation

HomeFront is committed and invested in collecting data from all our programs, client interactions and court proceedings. In so doing, HomeFront fills a critical demand from stakeholders, government and funders for meaningful data that describes in real and rigorous terms, the impacts and improvements the coordinated response to domestic violence is creating. It also allows full participation with other provincial and international evaluations examining domestic violence responses and informing global best practices.

Through its logic model as well as research and evaluation plan, HomeFront continuously evaluates program measurements and their outcomes – addressing policy implications and furthering its contributions to the domestic violence knowledge base within both its community of practice and the academic, political and social sciences fields.

This year, HomeFront is strategically focused on continually improving our database and IT infrastructure to ensure we can meet the demand for important and timely data.

#### **Domestic Conflict Response Team**

- > Supported 2,591 adults and 1,027 children; a 15% increase from last year.
- > Case managers made 8,571 client contacts.
- > 12,837 safety checks and safety plans completed with clients.

#### Domestic Violence Intervention & Resource Team

- Monitored, supported and intervened in 3,648 domestic violence cases.
- > 77% of clients reported feeling safe after HomeFront intervention.
- > 11,883 safety checks and safety plans completed with clients.

#### High Risk Management Initiative

- > Monitored, intervened and provided risk assessment for 19 high-risk offenders
- Served 28 victims; providing extensive and wrap around services to these individuals, including, emotional support, safety planning, resourcing and intervention.
